





# BUILDING A HEALTHIER FUTURE IN FY2019



## Advancing care through inclusive research

**UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES ARE ALSO UNDER-REPRESENTED IN MEDICAL RESEARCH; THEIR HEALTH ISSUES OFTEN AREN'T ADDRESSED AS RESEARCHERS ARE DEVELOPING NEW WAYS TO CURE DISEASE AND PROMOTE HEALTH.**

**TO ENSURE THE COMMUNITIES WE SERVE** benefit from medical advancements, while keeping Erie on the cutting edge of best practices in primary care, **Erie has expanded our research team.** This past year, Erie engaged in 10 active research projects in collaboration with a variety of partner institutions. Erie prioritizes sustainable and replicable projects in primary care settings that explore new approaches to improving wellness and advancing equity among underserved communities.

Current research projects include a study to help find ways to make it easier for people over age 55 to manage medications and an initiative to ensure Erie's patient population is better represented in a national project to gather biomedical data to advance precision medicine. ●



## Meeting a crucial—and growing—need in Lake County

**ERIE HEALTHREACH WAUKEGAN HEALTH CENTER, AN EVER-MORE VITAL HEALTHCARE HOME FOR LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS OF LAKE COUNTY, CELEBRATED ITS 5TH BIRTHDAY.**

**ERIE'S FIRST LOCATION OUTSIDE OF COOK COUNTY** opened in 2014 in response to the area's considerable lack of access to affordable quality healthcare providers. **The number of patients we see at Erie HealthReach has nearly tripled in five years.** We now care for nearly 9,800 men, women and children.

We also graduated the second class of residents who care for patients at Erie HealthReach through the Northwestern McGaw Family Medicine Residency at Lake Forest. We launched a delivery team at Vista Medical Center in Waukegan, delivering, on average, 30 babies each month, in addition to providing 700 women with prenatal and postpartum care at Erie HealthReach Waukegan. To meet a growing need for behavioral healthcare (15% of Lake County residents suffer from depression, for example), Erie Health Reach Waukegan expanded services by adding a psychiatric nurse practitioner and a second behavioral health therapist. ●



## Expanding access to care on the North Shore

**SINCE OPENING IN 2012, ERIE EVANSTON/SKOKIE HEALTH CENTER HAS SEEN AN 800% INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF PATIENTS WE SERVE EACH YEAR.**

**IN RESPONSE TO THIS EVER-GROWING NEED** for accessible, affordable healthcare on the North Shore, **we expanded the health center's footprint, doubling our capacity to serve the community.** The renovated location, which opened to patients in April 2019, added 17 new exam rooms and more space for behavioral health, health data analysis, community events and medical professional training.

*"The story of Erie Evanston/Skokie Health Center is truly the realization of a community-driven vision, sustained by deep partnerships and a long-term commitment to meeting community needs,"* said Lee Francis, Erie's President and CEO.

With this growth came an opportunity for Erie to also expand its medical staff and graduate medical training programs. Erie partnered with NorthShore University HealthSystem to bring the University of Chicago (NorthShore) Family Medicine Residency Program to Erie Evanston/Skokie Health Center. ●



### Supporting recovery through integrated treatment

**RECOGNIZING THE NEED FOR SUPPORTIVE, STRUCTURED, LONG-TERM SERVICES TO TREAT PATIENTS WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS, ERIE LAUNCHED A MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT) PROGRAM.**

#### PEOPLE STRUGGLING WITH OPIOID AND/OR ALCOHOL ADDICTION

work with a dedicated team of medical providers, therapists and care managers to **help guide them towards recovery.**

Erie's MAT pilot program is based at Erie Division Street in Chicago's Humboldt Park neighborhood, an area that has more than double the rate of opioid-related deaths compared to the city as a whole. Our approach integrates medical and behavioral health support; patients receive behavioral health counseling, through individual sessions or group therapy, as well as care management support, in tandem with their medication-assisted treatment.

Erie is expanding the program to our Evanston/Skokie location to better serve communities on Chicago's north side. The number of medical providers at Erie who are certified to prescribe suboxone and naltrexone, medications used in the treatment of substance use disorder, is also steadily growing. ●



### Introducing the importance of oral health on even the smallest smiles

**PROPER ORAL HEALTHCARE BEGINS BEFORE A BABY EVEN CUTS HER FIRST TOOTH.**

#### TO GET OUR YOUNGEST CHILDREN INTO CARE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE,

Erie launched **"Knee-to-Knee" dental exams** at Erie West Town Health Center, our busiest location for pediatric care.

Integrated as part of a routine medical exam, infants and toddlers ages 0–3 lay on a parent's lap, facing a dental provider. This gives the dentist an opportunity to do an oral exam, perform a cavity risk assessment, offer fluoride treatment and—just as important—educate the parent about age-appropriate oral health care, while the parent is able to comfort and encourage their child. Should further care be needed, parents can immediately schedule a follow-up appointment at one of the four Erie dental clinic locations. ●



### Leveraging technology to expand psychiatric care

**WITH THE PREVALENCE OF MENTAL HEALTH CONDITIONS WITHIN OUR COMMUNITIES YET INCREASING SCARCITY OF COMMUNITY-BASED MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCES, ERIE IS BUILDING CAPACITY WITHIN OUR PRIMARY CARE SETTING TO INCREASE ACCESS TO CRUCIAL SERVICES.**

#### ERIE IS INCREASING ACCESS TO AFFORDABLE PSYCHIATRIC SERVICES

by expanding our psychiatry team and making their high-quality services available in previously under-resourced areas through the **innovation of telehealth.**

After piloting telepsychiatry services at Erie HealthReach Waukegan in 2018, Erie began serving elementary school students and members of the community at two of our Chicago Public School-based sites this past year: Erie Westside in Humboldt Park and Erie Johnson in North Lawndale. Children and adults can now meet with a psychiatric nurse practitioner via teleconferencing sessions hosted in their trusted therapists' office, granting them convenient, timely access to the care they need. ●

# building a healthier future for the next generation

Raquel Briceno and her husband Freddy Hernandez had overcome a lot. As newly-arrived asylum-seekers from Venezuela, finding a healthcare provider was not their first priority. So, when Raquel became pregnant with their first son, they were fortunate that Erie Humboldt Park Health Center was right in their neighborhood. With Erie's deep experience in prenatal and pediatric care, Raquel and Freddy knew they would be in good hands.

Erie's interdisciplinary team collaborates to offer expectant mothers like Raquel both medical care to have a healthy pregnancy and resources to raise a healthy child. As she prepared for the baby's arrival, Erie provided Raquel with high-quality prenatal care, including dental care. Erie case manager Ana Sigda visited the home where Raquel and Freddy were living to ensure it had a safe place for the new baby to sleep and working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. She helped them enroll in a nutritional program and linked them to free car seats. "We received everything we needed to prepare for a healthy baby," Raquel says.

Today Raquel and Freddy are parents to two healthy and happy sons, two-year-old Thiago and five-month-old Thian. The whole family gets medical care at Erie, and the boys get dental care. Sigda will continue to assist the family until Thian turns one.

Meanwhile, Raquel and Freddy are learning English and have jobs earning them enough to move into their own apartment. "People get the right support and just keep advancing," Sigda says. "That's a good thing."

#### REACH OUT AND READ.

Erie's *Reach Out and Read* program provides a book to children ages 0 through 5 during each of their check-ups. Pediatricians advise parents to read to their kids every day and demonstrate how to use books to interact with young children at every stage of their development. Reading aloud helps cultivate a child's language skills and increases literacy rates.

# extending care outside of the exam room

While Erie provides care through more than 300,000 visits annually, much of what impacts patients' health happens outside of our exam rooms. For this reason, we continue to grow our programs that offer patients tools to overcome barriers to living their healthiest lives.

In 2019, Erie launched the nationally recognized Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP), an evidence-based class for patients at-risk of developing diabetes due to their higher than normal blood sugars. Erie offers transportation and childcare to encourage ongoing participation in this intensive year-long course where participants learn, practice, and support each other in healthy eating, physical activity and managing stress. "It's not just about food," program facilitator Rosio Patino says, "It's mind, body and soul."

The program has already made a difference for participants like Maria Del Rosario who has lost 19 pounds so far through regular Zumba and cooking more chicken, fish and vegetables at home. "I've tried losing weight, but never little by little" she says. Patino is not surprised by Maria's success; "As long as they put the work in, it works," she says.

In addition to DPP, Erie offered monthly diabetes drop-in education sessions, taught courses on selecting and preparing healthy foods using low-cost ingredients, and made available nearly 1,000 boxes of fresh, affordable produce and meats through a community partnership. "We tell people they can still enjoy the foods they like," she says, "just limit the ones that cause harm."

#### THE HEALTH JUSTICE PROJECT.

Civil legal concerns such as benefits discrimination, unsafe housing, and immigration issues can have an effect on our patients' health. Through the Health Justice Project, an innovative partnership among Erie, Loyola University School of Law and Legal Aid Chicago, Erie providers and staff identify patients with health-harming civil legal needs, and directly link them to no-cost legal services.

# investing in workforce development

More than 100 medical assistants (MAs) ensure that our patients receive efficient, integrated and compassionate care. To address the national shortage of MAs while creating career growth opportunities, Erie launched an on-site training program in partnership with the National Institute for Medical Assistant Advancement (NIMAA). Program coursework and clinical experience prepares students to get certified as MAs and work at Erie or in other underserved communities.

Many MA certification programs can be prohibitively expensive. Erie fully subsidizes the NIMAA program for participants committed to staying with us for at least 2,500 hours, or about 15 months. “Helping people complete something they otherwise couldn’t afford is great,” says program manager Victoria Fernandez. The program also teaches critical thinking, patient education, and disease management. “I was surprised at everything Erie offered besides just healthcare,” says student Marian Ogunoshon.

Within our first class of five students are Erie patients, employees and their family members. Erie will expand our second cohort to our Evanston/Skokie and Waukegan sites with up to 16 students who reflect our patients and communities trained each year.

The NIMAA program joins Erie’s array of programs training the next generation to provide care in underserved communities. In addition to training medical residents and students, dental students and healthcare administrators, we will welcome our first class of advanced practice nurse fellows in July 2020.

“I knew I wanted to do something in the medical field. I just didn’t know where to start,” shared NIMAA student Aurea Urquiza. Erie’s innovative training opportunity opened the door.

**TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION.**

To address the national shortage of primary care providers, Erie is training nearly 200 residents in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics and other specialties. Physicians trained in community health centers are three times more likely to work in similar settings upon graduation.






